CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Thye Hua Kwan Moral Society celebrated 40 years of history in 2018. From our humble beginnings, THKMS has grown into a full-fledged organisation with a comprehensive range of services to serve the community. Our services reach out to the elderly, families, children and youth as well as persons with disabilities.

To mark our anniversary celebrations, we launched the Paddy Project in partnership with the National Youth Council to promote youth volunteerism. The initiative engaged youth volunteers from tertiary institutions to participate in a door to door rice distribution campaign. More than 5,000 households received 10,000kg worth of rice that was sponsored by our corporate partner, Eu Yan Sang International.

The Child Care Centres run by Thye Hua Kwan Moral Society were rebranded as Super Talent Childcare Centres. The centres also underwent a revamp to cater to the learning needs of preschoolers.

THKMS ran the THK Charity Show 2018 that was held on the 18th March. The event successfully raised more than \$4.5million for our programmes and services. Part of the proceeds went towards our subsidiaries which include Ang Mo Kio-Thye Hua Kwan Hospital, Thye Hua Kwan Nursing Home and Thye Hua Kwan Moral Charities.

THK Senior Care Centre @ Kaki Bukit, managed by Thye Hua Kwan Nursing Home piloted a programme with telemedicine provider, Doctor Anywhere to facilitate video consultations for patients with a doctor from the telemedicine firm. This new model of care helps to save time and effort spent by caregivers to ferry elderly patients to and fro clinics and hospitals.

Thye Hua Kwan Moral Charities also continued to strengthen our efforts within the community by rolling out several new programmes and services to cater to the growing needs of the community. These include the THK Home for Disabled @ Sembawang that provides residential care for adults with autism, as well as 2 new Seniors Activity Centres in Fengshan to encourage healthy living and active ageing among the elderly. The Thye Hua Kwan temple opened its doors from 16th May

2019, with a Consecration Ceremony, Opening Light Ceremony, 3 days of Prayers and Triple Celebrations on 20th May 2019. The Chinese temple will embrace people of different faiths to come together to learn about various religious practices and beliefs. We do so with full respect to their race, colour, creed, language, culture and religion. These efforts are important in our quest to promote inter-religious understanding in our multiracial community, in view of the growing racial and religious divide in other parts of the world.

Our second floor library keeps sacred books from all religions. The first floor has 108 statues and portraits of 5 major religions: Lao Tze, Buddha, Confucius, Jesus Christ and the word Mohamed. The third floor is our Filial Piety hall. We encourage people, not to dump their deceased parents, at any columbarium, but to visit them often. Members are encouraged to give us for safe keeping, their deceased parents' or relatives' videos of their life history. It is always important to remember and love them.

We must continue to protect what is dear to us and strengthen our social fabric to ensure that those who need help are not left behind. To do so, Thye Hua Kwan Moral Society will continue to work closely with the community stakeholders such as ministries, government agencies, corporate companies, donors and volunteers to further our mission: To Serve Mankind. We thank you for the support as we continue to work together to reach out to those who need help regardless of race, colour or religion.

'Rice for the needy' project seeks youth volunteers

Nida Nur Adawiyah's passion for volunteerism was sparked by a trip to an old folks' home.

"I felt great. I loved seeing the happiness on residents' faces, and the joy and excitement that came with giving back," said the Greenridge Secondary School student.

This inspired her to join Project Y.O.U. - the youth initiative of Thyse Hua Kwan Moral Society's (THKMS) charity arm, Thyse Hua Kwan Moral Charities - in January last year.

Nida, 26, will devote several days over two months on her first major enterprise with the group - the Paddy Project, an eight-week rice

distribution campaign that will encourage young people to do something worthwhile, while gaining insight into social issues like ageing and poverty.

Young people who sign up for the project will pack and distribute rice bags - totalling 10,000kg - to elderly residents and low-income families in Singapore.

It aims to recruit volunteers with a truck that will visit tertiary institutions to get sign-ups.

Launched yesterday by Minister for Education Ong Ye Kung to mark THKMS' 40th anniversary, the project aims to rally some 200 young people and deliver rice to 5,000 households by the end of July.

"This sector, it's really not just about your brain, though smart people

are always welcome, also not just about skills... but a lot about the heart," said Mr Ong. "I see a lot of heart in our young people now."

Other guests at the event were Senior Minister of State for Trade and Industry Koh Poh Koon and Marine Parade GRC MP Seah Kian Peng.

The Paddy Project team, comprising 80 students from tertiary institutions like the Singapore University of Technology and Design and ITE College Central, as well as Project Y.O.U., has been busy.

It has over 2,000 rice bags packed. Over the next three weeks, the truck will stop by schools to recruit more volunteers - who will in turn reach out to households in need located in heartland neighbourhoods such as Bukit Panjang.

Bedok North and MacPherson. "Youths are stereotyped to be less... aware of social issues in the community. To us, that is not true. They just need the platform to realise these issues," said Thyse Hua Kwan Moral Charities chief operating officer Jason Lee.

If successful, the Paddy Project could see door-to-door distributions of more than just rice. "Of course, we are looking at whether the campaign can be scaled up," Mr Lee added.

THKMS is a non-profit group that operates over 90 programmes and services. It also runs initiatives such as THK Meals on Wheels, which delivers over 450,000 meals every year to the aged and sick.

Part of the proceeds from the Charity Show went towards supporting THK Nursing Home @ Hougang. Donations also supported unfunded programmes and services such as Free Meal Centres, free TCM and western clinic.

They embarked on a door to door distribution of rice packs to the elderly and low-income households in various housing estates such as Woodlands, Bukit Panjang, Jurong, Tanjong Pagar, Ang Mo Kio and Bedok North. A total of 10,000kg of rice that was donated by Eu Yan Sang benefitted about 5,000 households.

High-level inter-faith meet on the cards

Singapore could host a high-level international dialogue focused on inter-faith harmony as soon as next year – if the idea mooted recently by President Halimah Yacob takes shape.

Speaking to reporters yesterday, Madam Halimah said she is working with government agencies here on the details of the proposed dialogue, which she hopes will be on a similar level and have similar recognition as the annual Shangri-La Dialogue on security issues.

“While we are celebrating our religious and racial diversity as something that is good for us, in many other countries it is seen as a diff-

culty, a source of conflict,” she said, speaking on the sidelines of the 15th Inter Racial Inter Religious Harmony Nite.

“What we need to do is to see how we can share this understanding and that’s why I have suggested we have a high-level conference that encompasses not only Singapore but also other parts of the world.”

Asked when the dialogue could be held, Madam Halimah said she hopes Singaporeans can look forward to it “maybe next year”.

In May, Madam Halimah had mooted the idea of holding a high-level dialogue on inter-faith harmony similar to the annual Shangri-La Dialogue, where government leaders, military chiefs and experts from the Asia-Pacific discuss

latest security and defence matters. She said it would be “really wonderful” to have an inter-faith dialogue with that same level of prestige and status.

Yesterday, she reiterated that Singapore’s racial and religious harmony has not been by chance but by design through many progressive policies and practices, and that this harmony should constantly be broadened to embrace a wider part of society.

“We should not look at racial and religious harmony just as a source to prevent extremism, but rather we should see it as a way to develop people to respect and accommodate each other, to contribute towards the improvement of humanity,” said Madam Halimah.

She was guest of honour at the event, held at Singapore Expo, which marks the importance of racial and religious harmony here. In attendance were more than 2,200 Singaporeans and new citizens, as well as ambassadors and foreign diplomats from 18 countries.

At the event which featured seven cultural performances, President Halimah signed 15 pieces that will be presented to isries in Singapore, appreciation for the towards racial harmony.

Staff Training

At Super Talent Childcare Centres, continual professional development for staff is important because this helps to ensure that they build on their capabilities to remain competent in their fields. Moreover, it allows them to share knowledge, build networks, and keep abreast of the industry trends that may benefit their children and their families. Staff are given ample opportunities to attend workshops, events and courses organised by ECDA and other recognised providers.

Super Talent Childcare's preschool teachers attended a workshop on stress management, conducted by SEED Institute on 9 July 2018. During the workshop, the instructors from SEED Institute taught course participants how to identify the causes and symptoms of stress as well as strategies to deal with it. At the end of the session, the teachers were able to state potential work stressors, identify symptoms of stress and apply stress management techniques effectively.

SPARK is a quality assurance framework that provides recognition and support to Childcare centres and preschools for their efforts to improve teaching, learning, administrative and management processes so as to enhance the holistic development and well-being of young N2 to K2 children.

THK Student Care Centres

Thye Hua Kwan Moral Society runs 3 Student Care Centres to provide care and supervision to school-going children aged 7 years (Primary 1) to 14 years (Secondary 2). THK Student Care Centres (SCC) provide a conducive environment for the children's holistic development and provides support in areas such as homework supervision, organised play, enrichment and recreational activities.

Seng Kang Secondary School Volunteers

THK Student Care Centre @ Bedok North collaborated with Seng Kang Secondary School to come up with activities that benefitted the students of THK Student Care Centre as part of the Values in Action (VIA) programme. Values in Action (VIA) are learning experiences that support students' development as socially responsible citizens who contribute meaningfully to the community, through the learning and application of values such as care and respect, as well as knowledge and skills. Students of Seng Kang Secondary assisted THK Student Care Centre students with their homework and engaged them in several activities such as card games and board games.

THK Senior Care Centre @ Kaki Bukit

Since November 2018, THK Student Care Centre @ Bedok North has collaborated with THK Senior Care Centre @ Kaki Bukit to promote intergenerational bonding and bridge gaps between the young and elderly through a series of social activities. The children and elderly participated in storytelling sessions and other activities such as Zumba and board games. THK Student Care Centre @ Bedok North conducted the visits twice a week to encourage students to build rapport with the elderly.

Partnership with Anglo - Chinese School

In collaboration with Anglo-Chinese School, student volunteers contributed their time and knowledge over a 10-week curriculum, that aimed to reach out to children that required additional assistance in their school work. Over the weeks, the students saw improvements in studies, and friendships were forged through tuition and activities designed to challenge their mental skills, art workshops and outdoor activities.

Angsana Home @ Pelangi Village

Angsana Home @ Pelangi Village is a gazetted Welfare Home under the Destitute Persons Act. The Home renders care and rehabilitation to destitute persons. It also operates an intake centre. The Home can accommodate 180 main home residents and 20 intake centre residents

Thye Hua Kwan Moral Society (THKMS) was awarded and contracted for a term of 3 years of managing agent rights for Angsana Home with effect from 1st April 2018 onwards by the Ministry of Social and Family development (MSF). The model of care at the Home involves holistic assessment of their residents' needs, fostering individual care plans and interim goals, and empowering the residents with support and services. Our multidisciplinary team comprises nursing, operations, programme, case management and administration staff coming together as an integrated unit to ensure timely support and quality care.

Strategic Partnership

In 2018, the Home continued to collaborate with National Addictions Management Services (NAMS), particularly with their counsellors, occupational therapists and psychiatrists. NAMS conducted sessions with the residents on a weekly basis.

The Home continued to foster close working relations with external partners such as New Hope, Industrial & Services Co-operative Society Ltd, National Addictions Management Services, Institute of Mental Health and Singapore Association for Mental Health. The Case Management team also explored working with Seniors Activity Centres (SACs) for collaboration to conduct Joint Singles Scheme (JSS) housing matching between the SAC's clients and suitable Home residents as part of their discharge plans.

Strategic Planning

The Home has embarked on strategic planning for forecasted needs. This plan, known as the "Angsana Future Ready Masterplan", will be executed in 3 phases, spanning over 2018 - 2020. The plan involves strategic planning for the Home's infrastructure in areas of information technology systems, security enhancement, effective space planning of the premises, as well as staff development in areas such as service delivery, professionalism and overall competencies. In 2018, the work focused on planning, facilitating and coordinating resources. The implementation and evaluation of outcomes will take place in the coming years.



Moral Welfare Home

Moral Welfare Home is a gazetted welfare home of the Ministry of Social and Family Development. Thye Hua Kwan Moral Society is the managing agent for the Ministry and helps to administer care, reception and rehabilitation of destitute persons. 80% of the residents are intellectually disabled and all of them are diagnosed with multiple disabilities.

The Home also set up a computer literacy programme to engage residents with higher functional skills.

Ang Mo Kio – Thye Hua Kwan Hospital (AMKH) is a 370-bedded step-down care facility that is primarily focused on rehabilitative care. The Hospital also provides sub-acute care, dementia care as well as pre-terminal palliative care for our patients. The aim is to help patients achieve independence and integration into the community.

The Hospital makes continuous effort to provide seamless care for patients by identifying service gaps, as well as to empower the community through training programmes.

Hospital Expansion

As part of the Hospital's expansion plans, a 170 square metre gym and rehabilitation space have also been added. Ward 2 South (Isolation Ward) also commenced operations on 3 April 2018. The ward has 10 single-patient isolation rooms which help to control the spread of infection from patients requiring isolation.

Animal Therapy

Prolonged stay in a hospital can often affect a patient's mood and social well-being. Ang Mo Kio-Thye Hua Kwan Hospital created a therapeutic experience for patients by introducing Pet Therapy through Animal-Assisted-Activity (AAA) and Animal-Assisted-Therapy (AAT).

Partners such as Save our Street Dogs (SoSD) and Cat-Assisted Therapy Singapore (CATS) were engaged to support the programme. Over 100 interaction sessions have been conducted for the patients since the programme's inception.

The winners came from 30 public healthcare institutions, community hospitals, intermediate and long-term care sector agencies and private healthcare bodies.

Organised by the SingHealth Duke-NUS Academic Medical Centre, the awards have recognised healthcare professionals from the acute and community care sectors since 2011.

"With more patients having multiple medical conditions in an ageing population, multi-disciplinary care to address different needs will become more crucial," said Minister for Health Gan Kim Yong, who was guest of honour at the event.

Another Superior Award winner was Dr Chan Yew Meng, a senior consultant at Singapore General Hospital's (SGH) Department of Otolaryngology.

He took the prize in the clinician category for his pioneering work in the field of tinnitus – a condition that causes ringing in the ears – after starting SGH's Tinnitus Clinic.

Ren Ci Community Hospital won the best team award in the "service initiative improvement team category" for reducing the number of delayed discharges.

By improving communication with caregivers, it managed to cut the number of discharge delays from 23 to two in 2016.

Nurse manager Lingaraj Prabha, 37, who was part of the project team, said: "I'm happy that my patients are discharged on time... if we didn't do this project, we would not have put ourselves into others' shoes."

Dogs Max and Cabl, together with their feline friend Alfie, are among the six animals whose owners

have volunteered for the weekly half-hour sessions, which help dementia patients and those with other cognitive problems improve their well-being.

The programme, which is the first of its kind here, is the brainchild of senior occupational therapist Geena Anandajah, who was inspired by her love for animals growing up and the "emotional support" her pets provided.

"As dementia progresses, the patients lose the ability to communicate so they might not be able to tell you how they feel," said Ms Anandajah, who won the Superior Award in the intermediates and long-term care allied health category at the Singapore Health Quality Service Awards 2018 yesterday.

"But (the dogs) are quite sensitive (and) I feel they look more at

the person's body language. It doesn't matter what you say, whether you speak or not, but they're able to pick up these cues from the patients."

THK Nursing Home @ Hougang provides quality nursing care for up to 285 seniors, including 114 beds for those with dementia. The nursing home provides a person-centred and safe environment to facilitate aging in the community.

A series of programmes and community partnerships are in place to keep the residents engaged and actively stimulated to counter the four major problems of loneliness, boredom, despair and isolation which are common problems for many seniors staying in residential care.

Tutti Bath Project

THK Nursing Home @ Hougang introduced the Tutti Bath project in 2018. The Tutti Assisted Bathtub improved bath times for the wheelchair and bed-bound residents in the nursing home, thereby increasing the efficiency of the work process for care staff. The tub fills in just 50 seconds and only 1 staff is required to supervise the session and administer the bathing system. The Tutti Automated Bath System helped to improve quality and dignity of care through “Jacuzzi-style” automated bath and increase productivity of staff by reducing man-hours required.

CoMoFit Programme

The Home embarked on the CoMoFit programme that is specifically designed for use by the elderly. The programme can be catered to suit the users’ physical and cognitive capabilities. The choice of exercise and theme is tailored according to the needs and interests of the user. As an evidence-based tool, the programme seeks to improve and maintain physical and cognitive functioning through therapeutic video games. Seniors living with dementia also benefited by taking part in these physical and social activities which helps to boost their self-confidence.

Sensory Room

The Home has a sensory room equipped with sensory activities for the elderly to provide a level of stimulation. This helps to increase awareness and attention. Matching the sensory demand of the activity with a well-designed environment help the elderly living with dementia to participate actively.

The sensory room combines gentle light, movement, music and tactile objects designed to calm or stimulate residents. This can help to enhance the feelings of comfort and well-being, relieve any stress or pain, and maximize the resident's potential to focus. All of these help them to improve communication and memory. The Home's therapy team conducts 4 sessions a week.

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THKNH Home Care Services

Thye Hua Kwan Nursing Home Limited provides Home Care Services to serve clients who are not suitable for centre-based services. Home Care Services help to support frail and homebound clients in areas such as personal hygiene, housekeeping and mind-stimulation activities.

- Home Medical & Nursing programme serves clients who require medical or nursing care due to various chronic conditions or terminal illnesses.
- Home Personal Care Services provide help in medication care, personal hygiene, mind-stimulation activities, simple prescribed exercises, elder-sitting and caregiver respite, as well as running simple errands.
- Interim Care Services provides assistance in nutrition and feeding, wound care, respiratory care, tube/catheter care and stoma care.

THK Senior Care Centre @ Kaki Bukit

THK Senior Care Centre @ Kaki Bukit has the capacity to care for around 80 seniors. It offers a range of step-down care services to provide a conducive and engaging environment for the elderly clients to stay active while receiving medical care.

Community Telehealth programme

More than 30 clients and their caregivers have benefited from Community Telehealth programme. Apart from allowing the clients to receive doctor's consultation at the Senior Care Centre during their time at the centre. Besides reducing the waiting time involved, the service has helped to reduce the need for clients and their families to travel to and fro hospitals and clinics for appointments and consultations. We have extended the service further to include doctor's assessments for rehabilitation certification, funding eligibility as well as wound care.

Maintenance Day Care & Centre-Based Nursing

The Maintenance Day Care Centre serves elderly clients who are frail or physically disabled. Programmes and activities run by our therapists allow them to maintain or improve their general, physical and social well-being. The programme also serves elderly who require nursing care for wound related problems and provides respite and support for caregivers who require assistance in caring for their loved ones.

Dementia Day Care Centre

The Dementia Day Care Centre serves elderly clients who are diagnosed with dementia and living in the community. Similarly, caregiver support is also given to caregivers who require respite or support.

Day Rehabilitation Centre

Evening therapy sessions are also available to allow family members to bring clients in for therapy after working hours.

The Home has a capacity to accommodate up to 180 clients.

New Seniors Activity Centres in Fengshan

This brings the THKMC's network of eldercare services to a total of 17 Seniors Activity Centres, on top of other eldercare services that support the elderly to age in place in the community.

New initiative integrates special needs kids into mainstream schools

An initiative has been launched with the aim of integrating special needs children into a mainstream school setting.

It is one of several in a pilot programme by the Ministry of Social and Family Development to better cater to the diversity of children who are taking part in the Early Intervention Programme for Infants and Children (Epic).

Epic centres at Thye Hua Kwan (THK), SPD, which helps people with disabilities; and the Asian Women's Welfare Association are

working together with the ministry to trial these new initiatives.

Under the new initiative, special needs children in Epic centres are taught by professionals trained in early intervention alongside their pre-school teachers.

The Epic professionals also advise mainstream pre-school teachers, who may not have had training on how to handle such children.

Results have been encouraging so far.

"Not only are pre-school teachers now better equipped to handle children with special needs, mainstream pre-school pupils are also picking up how to encourage the

Epic child," said Ms Low Hwee San, acting divisional director of the THK Epic centre.

"It has been heart-warming to see how even young pupils model after our Epic staff, and encourage their classmate with special needs to join in class activities."

These initiatives were unveiled by the Minister for Social and Family Development Desmond Lee at the inaugural Early Intervention Conference yesterday.

The current child-support model adopted by Epic uses a one-size-fits-all approach, said Mr Lee.

But he noted the "needs of Epic children vary widely".

such as guidance on how to interact with friends, Mr Lee said.

This also means children who have made sufficient progress in Epic can be integrated into mainstream schools, he added.

Ms Low said: "This new initiative goes beyond benefiting children from our Epic centres. By enabling Epic professionals to work collaboratively with mainstream pre-schools, we can increase inclusiveness in the mainstream pre-school setting.

"This is what an inclusive society is all about."

"Some of them may respond better to intervention provided in the mainstream pre-school setting, while others may require more intensive and individual intervention at the beginning."

The new pilot programme aims to allow for variation in the intensity of support provided to pupils with special needs, as well as flexibility to accommodate the growth of a child with special needs over time.

For example, a child may not be able to follow instructions in the beginning, and require more support from staff.

Over time, however, he may require a different kind of support –







Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Thye Hua Kwan Moral Society (the "Society") set out on pages 6 to 44, which comprise the statement of financial position (balance sheet) as at 31 December 2018, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in funds and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Singapore Standards on Auditing (SSAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Society in accordance with the *Accounting and Corporate Regulatory Authority (ACRA) Code of Professional Conduct and Ethics for Public Accountants and Accounting Entities (ACRA Code)* together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Singapore, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ACRA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Matter

The financial statements of the Society for the financial year ended 31 December 2017 were audited by another auditor who expressed an unmodified opinion on those statements on 14 June 2018.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in Society Information 2018 and the Statement by Management Committee set out on pages 1 and 2 but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not and will not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information identified above and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed on the other information that we obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and The Management Committee for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with the provisions of the Societies Act, the Charities Act and Regulations and FRSS, and for devising and maintaining a system of internal accounting controls sufficient to provide a reasonable assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorised use or disposition; and transactions are properly authorised and that they are recorded as necessary to permit the preparation of true and fair financial statements and to maintain accountability of assets.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Society or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Management Committee is responsible for overseeing the Society's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SSAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SSAs, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Society's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.

If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Society to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Management Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

- (a) the accounting and other records required to be kept by the Society have been properly kept in accordance with the provisions of the Societies Regulations enacted under the Societies Act, the Charities Act and Regulations; and
- (b) the fund-raising appeal held during the financial year has been carried out in accordance with Regulation 6 of the Societies Regulations issued under the Societies Act and proper accounts and other records have been kept of the fund-raising appeal.

During the course of our audit, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that during the financial year, the fund-raising appeal held during the financial year has not been carried out in accordance with Regulations 7 of the Charities (Fund-Raising Appeals for Local and Foreign Charitable Purposes) Regulations 2012, and that the proper accounts and other records have not been kept of the fund-raising appeal.
