

Worm Crafting Experiment

In this activity, the K2s of Super Talent Childcare (Macpherson 122) can understand more about worms and how they contract and expand when moving by doing a simple experiment.

Crafting and experimenting allows children to learn and pick up on information in a hands-on manner and provides them with an opportunity to improve on their fine motors skills when they are engaged in manipulating with different resources.

Through this the children are provided with opportunities to have fun and enriching experiences by watching how a worm wiggles and expands when they spray coloured dyes on a tissue worm that they have made!



Super Talent Childcare (Macpherson 93) N2 Activity: "Monet's Water Lily"

In the words of Claude Monet – "Never, even as a child would I bend a rule."

On the contrary, our interpretation of Claude Monet's "Water Lily" is open to breaking the rules. Using a scrunched-up tissue paper and blue food colouring, children can easily recreate their own impressionist painting. To add texture and dimension, children cut facial tissues and baking cases to make lily pads and water lilies. By experimenting with white glue, not only does the glue holds everything together but as it bleeds, it spreads and blends in with the colours to create rippling movements in the pond. The effect truly captures the natural flow of the water beautifully.

K1 Explores Frog Habitats! 🛎 🌢

Our K1 kids had a splash of fun learning about frogs by creating their own mini pond habitats! After watching a video about where frogs live and why they need water, the children got hands-on—adding water, lily pads, rocks, frog eggs, and even rubber ducks to their trays.





They explored how frogs jump, how tadpoles swim, and swapped ponds with friends to compare habitats. A fun way to learn about nature, life cycles, and teamwork!

Batik Art

The K1 and K2 children from Membina went to Kamal Arts Studio for 'Batik Art for Preschool' under National Arts Council – Arts Education Programmes for Preschool (NAC-AEP). In line with the upcoming Hari Raya Puasa, this activity was planned to allow the children to have a better understanding of the Malay culture in art forms.

The instructor, Mr Kamal introduced the children to Batik painting in a fun and engaging way. Children were able to understand that batik prints can be found on clothing that people wore and how batik painting is done on cloth.

After that, children have a fun time and handson experience in painting on pre-waxed batik design provided which they brought back as a keepsake.

Before heading back, the children took a walk around the Geylang Serai Bazaar to look at some traditional Malay costumes and snacks.

Social Development

As part of their social development skills, our students actively engage in discussions and participate in role plays during curriculum time. These activities promote open communication, helping students build stronger relationships with one another. The interactions extend peer-to-peer conversations; include meaningful exchanges with teachers as well. Students often bond during lunch and homework time, where they have heart-to-heart conversations and support each other by answering homework questions. Beside bonding relationship in the centre, we also encourage students to actively participate in creating personalized cards for Mother's Day, Father's Day, Kindness Day and Friendship Day.







Emotional Development

To help students better understand and manage their emotions, we partnered with a dedicated service provider to conduct a Mindfulness Workshop for our students. Through this session, students explored practical techniques to build self-awareness and emotional resilience.

We actively encourage our students to express themselves freely — even if it means being a little silly! After all, self-expression is a key part of emotional growth.

Creative outlets like music, movement, and art offer fun and meaningful ways for students (and all of us!) to explore and share our feelings in a safe and joyful environment.

Cognitive Development

Our Centre offers a variety of enrichment classes such as varieties of workshops during the school holidays. These classes are designed to challenge students and develop essential skills like problem-solving, critical thinking, and creativity.

We also emphasize the importance of daily reading and weekly spelling practice, both of which play a vital role in strengthening language skills and boosting cognitive development.

During the school holidays, we continue the learning journey with specially curated activities that combine fun with educational outcomes. These holiday programmes are designed to inspire lifelong learning through hands-on experiences that are both engaging and meaningful





Spiritual Development

To foster cultural awareness, our students celebrate a variety of cultural events such as the Chinese New Year, Lantern Festival, Deepavali, Racial Harmony Day, Christmas, National Day, Museum visit and many more!

By embracing these celebrations and visits, we aim to nurture confident, compassionate, and open-minded individuals who appreciate the richness of different cultures and traditions.

Case Management

While the team's foundational training is in Psychology, its practice is increasingly shaped by integrated social work principles, trauma-informed care, and rehabilitative justice frameworks.

In 2024–2025, the team deepened its commitment to the Singapore Association of Social

Workers (SASW) Code of Ethics, embedding reflective supervision and peer learning into monthly clinical governance cycles. Staff development was further enhanced through targeted external training in:

- Motivational interviewing for high-risk populations
- Trauma-informed de-escalation techniques
- Cross-sectoral case coordination

These efforts have strengthened the team's capacity to manage complex cases with agility, empathy, and evidence-based precision. The Case Management team continues to support the Nursing and Operations units in maintaining seamless daily operations. In 2024–2025, the team also contributed to data-informed reporting for the Ministry of Social and Family Development (MSF), aligning client progress metrics with national reintegration benchmarks.

- Discharge rate: Surpassed the Home's annual benchmark of 10% muster discharge
- Client satisfaction: 85% of clients reported improved wellbeing and goal clarity
- Stakeholder feedback: Positive ratings on inter-agency coordination and case

responsiveness

Staff development: 100% of team members completed at least one external training module

As part of our ongoing efforts to reintegrate residents into the community, our Case Management Team worked closely with MSF to identify suitable candidates for discharge. Ms H was identified as having strong discharge potential.

An application for HDB rental housing was successfully submitted on her behalf, and she underwent structured pre-discharge training. This included community orientation, budgeting and life skills, safe use of public transport, medication management, and participation in religious and social activities.

Ms H has since secured a rental flat, which she shares with another resident, Ms C, who is being supported for discharge in FY2025/2026. She has also completed several successful Home Leave trials, showing a high level of independence and stability in managing her daily life and finances.

Home continues to provide regular follow-up and support, with the goal of facilitating a successful and sustained reintegration into the community.

Moral Welfare Home marks all the major festivals in the Singapore calendar and ensures that all our residents are able to celebrate and enjoy them, in Home as well as through various outings. Addtionally, residents' birthdays are celebrated throughout the year.

THK TCM MEDICAL SERVICES



We remain steadfast in our mission to provide accessible, inclusive, and high-quality medical care to all—regardless of race, colour, creed, language, culture, or religion. Upholding these core values, our medical services continue to reach out to those in need through our free clinic and Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) offerings.

Our THK TCM Medical Centre at Taman Jurong continues to play a vital role in supporting the community's health and well-being. Operating twice in the mornings and twice in the evenings each week, the centre offers flexible hours designed to accommodate the varied schedules of our patients. This accessibility reflects the growing trust the community places in our care.

Over the past year, we have continued to enhance our services, ensuring that traditional healing practices remain relevant and effective in meeting modern healthcare needs. Our holistic approach to TCM promotes not only physical wellness but also mental and emotional balance—encouraging a deeper, more interconnected understanding of health.

We are also proud to share the launch of our second free TCM clinic at MacPherson in August 2025.

THKMS WELFARE SERVICES

THK FUNERAL RITES



This year, THK continued its commitment to supporting families through our Free Funeral Rites program. A total of 15 beneficiaries received assistance through the Coffin Fund, helping to ease the financial burden of funeral expenses during a difficult time.

We remain deeply grateful to Toa Payoh Seu Teck Sean Tong for their generous support, which makes this initiative possible. Through their continued partnership, we are able to provide compassionate aid to those in need, ensuring that families can honour their loved ones with dignity and respect.

The Coffin Fund remains a vital source of comfort and relief for our beneficiaries, and we thank our donors and community partners for their unwavering support.

ANG MO KIO - THYE HUA KWAN HOSPITAL

Sustained, Accelerated Growth

In 2024, Ang Mo Kio – Thye Hua Kwan Hospital (AMK – THKH) cared for more than 1,500 inpatients, conducted over 17,000 haemodialysis sessions at our dialysis centres, and recorded more than 11,600 outpatient therapy visits to our Day Rehabilitation Centre.

Over the past year, AMK – THKH has tripled the size of its Home Health Team, increasing capacity to support patients transitioning home and providing care tailored to their specific needs and environment. Adopting a holistic approach, the team integrates different aspects of care across settings, recognising that rehabilitative outcomes depend not only on clinical care but also on psychosocial and emotional support. Initiatives supporting this approach include a renal support group connecting dialysis patients and caregivers to share best practices, recipes, challenges, and hopes, as well as nurse-led training for peritoneal dialysis patients now offered in four languages.

Commitments to Excellence

Hospital Management Asia (HMA) Awards 2024

The speech therapists at AMK – THKH launched the Optimising Thickened Fluid Preparation by Nursing Staff to Improve Patient Safety project (Oct 2022 – May 2024) to reduce dysphagia risks caused by improperly prepared fluids. The project focused on two key interventions: education and equipment. Education efforts included verbal presentations, demonstrations, one-on-one assessments with feedback, and clear labels on thickener cans with correct fluid-to-thickener ratios. For equipment, calibrated measuring cups were placed at patients' bedsides to ensure accurate fluid measurement. These initiatives improved fluid preparation accuracy by up to 150%, enhanced patient safety, and boosted nurses' confidence. The project won the Excellence Award in Clinical Effectiveness Improvement at the Hospital Management Asia Awards 2024 and aligns with AMK – THKH's early adoption of EatSafe SG standards. Yearly in-service training is conducted to sustain these results and reduce dysphagia risks.

Rehabilitation Research in Collaboration with NTU

In collaboration with the Rehabilitation Research Institute of Singapore (RRIS) at NTU, AMK – THKH is researching a single-sided lower limb exoskeleton to support stroke patients with hemiplegia. The pilot phase showed promising results in improving mobility, and the project has now progressed to Phase 2 to refine usability through data collection, with Phase 3 focusing on obstacle navigation in real-life environments. Beyond enhancing patient mobility and safety, the initiative fosters a culture of research and innovation among physiotherapists. If successful, it could transform stroke care by helping patients recover faster, regain independence, and improve their quality of life.

Nursing Quality Day

AMK – THKH continues to motivate and upskill staff to provide safe care and improve clinical outcomes. The hospital held its inaugural Nursing Quality Day in October 2024, organised by the Nursing Division and Quality Improvement Committee to foster a culture of continuous improvement in nursing. Focused on patient safety and care excellence, the event showcased projects enhancing nursing performance, learning experiences, and caregiver education through posters and presentations. It raised awareness of evidence-based practices and encouraged nurses to take an active role in quality and safety initiatives. Open to all hospital staff, the event promoted cross-disciplinary collaboration. Three projects were later invited for ePoster presentations at the International Forum on Quality and Safety in Healthcare 2025

TEMI at the Wards

In early 2025, AMK – THKH also introduced TEMI service robots in its wards to enhance patient safety, morale, and nurse productivity. These robots can play media, deliver small items such as newspapers and magazines, and conduct ward patrols using their cameras. By handling routine tasks such as patient orientations, temi robots free up nurses to focus on direct patient care. As more uses are developed, patients can also enjoy lighthearted interactions, including friendly reminders to stay safe in the wards.

ANG MO KIO - THYE HUA KWAN HOSPITAL

Dialysis Dining Made Delicious is a cookbook launched by dietitians to help dialysis patients and their caregivers prepare meals that meet specific nutritional needs, such as higher protein and lower sodium or potassium. Featuring sixteen Chinese, Malay, and Indian recipes tailored to local tastes, the cookbook includes nutritional guidelines and tips for better diet management at home. Soft-launched in late 2024, it has been shared with patients at dialysis centres and renal support groups, receiving positive feedback and suggestions. The official launch took place during the February 2025 Lunar New Year celebrations, where Mr Yip Hon Weng, MP for Yio Chu Kang SMC, presented commemorative copies to patients who had tried and enjoyed the recipes.

Looking Ahead

AMK – THKH is committed to advancing excellence in nursing training while continuing to enhance renal care and stroke management. We aim to ensure a smooth transition of care for patients, delivering a healing experience that is empathetic, compassionate, efficient, and effective—reflecting the core mission and values of AMK – THKH.

Looking forward, we aspire to play a greater role in the community care ecosystem by expanding outreach and health education activities. The encouragement and support from community leaders, agencies, donors, and staff will drive these efforts forward. With their continued partnership, we are confident in weaving a new chapter and embracing the journey ahead.



With our Development Support and Learning Support (DS-LS) Programme and six Early Intervention Programme for Infants and Children (EIPIC) Centres, THK EIC Services adopt a child-centred approach to help young children with developmental needs attain their full potential through meaningful and fun interactions. Our trans-disciplinary team collaborates closely with families to enhance children's socioemotional skills, supporting smoother integration into society

Forest Fables



Forest Fables is a six-session, nature-based programme currently taking place at THK EIPIC Centre @ Ang Mo Kio, where it has been running since 2024. Combining outdoor learning with early intervention goals, the programme is delivered in collaboration with community arts group, Muein, and supported by trained Forest School practitioners. Children take part in story-led activities at Bishan Park, fostering a meaningful connection with nature through immersive experiences

Through art therapy sessions conducted our team of Art by Therapists, the children at THK EIPIC expressed their creativity Centres through artworks that reflected their growth, self-expression, imagination. These pieces were proudly displayed at Punggol Regional Library from 10 January to 25 June 2025, and a virtual art exhibition is currently running on the THKMC website.



Early Intervention Conference 2024



THK EIC Services collaborated with 9 other Early Intervention (EI) agencies and partners to organise the Early Intervention Conference 2024 which was held on 26 April 2024. The event was attended by Mr Masagos Zulkifli, Minister for Social and Family Development. Our trans-disciplinary team contributed by sharing insights from their diverse expertise.




On 22 June 2024, THK Family Services organised the Celebrating Families, which coincided with MSF's month-long National Family Festival 2024. The event




THKMC-NUS Student Research Collaboration

Responsibilities of Management and The Management Committee for the Financial Statements (continued)

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Society or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Management Committee is responsible for overseeing the Society's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SSAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SSAs, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
 error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is

 resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery,

If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Society to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Management Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
